Reader: To You, O Lord, will I call. O my God, be not silent to me!

Choir: O Lord, save Your people and bless Your inheritance!

Reader: O Lord, save Your people ...

Choir: ... and bless Your inheritance!

Deacon: Wisdom!

Reader: The Reading from the Epistle of the Holy Apostle Paul to the
Hebrews.

Deacon: Let us attend!

Reader: Since we have such a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold on firmly to our confession. Certainly, we do not have a high priest who cannot sympathize with our infirmities, but one who has been taught by trial in all things just as we are, yet without sin.

Therefore, let us approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace for assistance in time of need.

Every high priest is selected from among men and is appointed for their sake in matters pertaining to God, so that he may offer both gifts and sacrifices for [their] sins. The high priest can deal gently with those who are ignorant and going astray since he himself is also subject to weakness.

Because of this, he must offer sacrifices for the sins of the people, as well as for himself. Moreover, nobody assumes this honor by himself but one is called by God, just as Aaron was. Likewise, Christ did not glorify himself to be made a high priest, but it was God who said to him:

*You are my Son:
Today I have become your father.*

As he says also in another place:

*You are a priest forever,
According to the order of Melchizedek.*

Gospel: (37) Mark 8:34-9:1

Priest: The reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. **Mark**.

Choir: Glory to You O Lord, Glory to You.

Priest: Let us Attend!

The Lord said: “Whoever wants to come after me, let him deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. Indeed, whoever wants to save his life will lose it; and whoever will lose his life for my sake and for the sake of the Good News will save it. What will it profit if someone gains the whole world and loses his life? Or what will someone give in exchange for his life?”

Whoever will be ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man also will be ashamed of when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.”

Jesus said to them, “Amen, I tell you that there are some standing here who will not taste death until they see the Kingdom of God come with power.”
