Reader: The Prokeimenon, in the 8th Tone: Pray and make your vows before the Lord, our God!

Choir: Pray and make your vows before the Lord, our God!

Reader: In Judah God is known; His name is great in Israel.

Choir: Pray and make your vows before the Lord, our God!!

Reader: Pray and make your vows ...

Choir: ... before the Lord, our God!

Deacon: Wisdom!

Reader: Brethren, salvation is now nearer to us than when we first believed! The night is far gone, and the day is near. Let us therefore throw off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light. Let us walk decently, as in the day; not in parties and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and lustful acts,

and not in strife or jealousy. Instead, put on the Lord Jesus Christ and do not think how to satisfy the flesh and its lusts.

Accept the one who is weak in faith, but not to enter into arguments over disputable matters. One has faith to eat all things while the weak eats only vegetables. The one who eats [everything] should not look down on the one who does not eat. The one who does not eat should not judge the one who eats because God has accepted him. Who are you who judge someone else's servant? He stands or falls to his own master! Yes, that one will be made able to stand, because God has the power to make someone stand.

Priest: Peace be to you.

Alleluia: Tone 6

Reader: And to Your spirit. In the 6th Tone: Alleluia, Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Reader: It is good to give thanks to the Lord, to sing praises to Your Name, O Most High.

Choir: Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Reader: to declare Your mercy in the morning, and Your truth by night.

Gospel: (17) Matthew 6:14-21

Priest: The reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Matthew. Choir: Glory to You O Lord, Glory to You.

The Lord said: For if you forgive people their offenses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive people their offenses, neither will your Father forgive your offenses.

Moreover, when you fast, do not be like the hypocrites with their gloomy faces. For they disfigure their faces so that people may see that they are fasting. Amen, I tell you: they have received their reward. But you, when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face so that people may not see that you are fasting. Only your Father who is in secret will see, and your Father, who sees in secret, will reward you openly.

Do not store up treasures for yourselves on the earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal. Instead, store for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consume, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

### Lenten Confession

It is expected that all Orthodox Christians will regularly take part in confession. One of the most important times for confession is during Great Lent. To facilitate confessions, Fr. Marty will be available Friday evenings after the

Akathist Hymn during Great Lent, in addition to after Vespers on Saturday evenings. Other times can be arranged by appointment.

#### Lenten Schedule

As in the past, we will try to celebrate as many of the Lenten Services as we are able. Each Wednesday night during Lent we will serve the Divine Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts, and each Friday night we will pray the Akathist Hymn to the Theotokos.
